



















#### PAST LEAD CREWS AND THEIR NEWS...



The infinity pool has undisturbed views out to the Dragonera, Atoko and Oxia Islands. It is a perfect vantage point over Sivota Bay.




The outdoor barbecue area is ideal for preparing those all important Mediterranean dinners and lunches and the kitchen is well equipped.



#### **OUR NEW BENETEAU 38.1'S ARE DELIVERED FROM FRANCE**

Four of our flotilla crews brave the January weather...

Our new boats start their life in Port Napoleon, a small marina and boatyard west of Marseille.

They arrive wrapped in plastic, without rigging, anti-foul or guard rails. Our commissioning crews build the rigs, fit the distinctive frames over the cockpits and check all the engineering systems.

All the work is carried out by our own staff, allowing us to train new skippers in maintenance and rigging from the ground up.



Once the yachts are complete, we prepare them for their maiden voyage. With the spacious design of the new 38.1 it was easy to store food, water and fuel for the long passages.

Our new boats need their engines "run in" so, for the first couple of days, the crews run the engines at steady revs.

This gives them the best performance for their lives on flotilla.

The delivery crews are a mix of seasoned skippers and newer staff. This year three of our boats were skippered by our RYA instructor team, headed by Pete Newman our chief instructor so they were in safe hands!

The journey started on Tuesday 29<sup>th</sup> January. Our first leg was a 200nm passage from Port Napoleon to Port-De Macinaggio on the northern tip of Corsica.



With strong following winds and some large seas, it was a great chance to test our boats and our crews.

The new 38.1 has a fantastic touch screen chart plotter in the cockpit along with a strong and accurate auto helm system.

In January the Mediterranean Sea can be fierce. Cold northerly winds and deep areas of low pressure combine to whip up some challenging sailing conditions. We saw this first hand on our next leg.



Aiming to use a gap in the weather, we headed over to the Italian coast near Rome.

We pushed through building southerly weather and strong winds all day until a small hitch forced us to change our plan just a little.

In the dark and swell one of the boats had run over a thick floating line. The prop wrap stalled the engine and forced us to seek shelter closer than we had aimed.

We made for Porto Stefano on the Argentario peninsula. With no engine the only safe option was to sail into the marina and then onto the quay. As a Yachtmaster instructor, Pete teaches this technique and demonstrated an excellent piece of sailing skill to his crew (show off).

The third leg of our journey followed the coast of Italy south towards the Straights of Messina. This is a narrow stretch of water between western Italy and eastern Sicily.

The beautiful town of Tropea lay 320nm to the south and it would take us at least 50 hours to reach.

The first day saw very changeable conditions but constant improvement.

However, the first night of the passage proved to be a wild ride. In rain and gale force winds we moved closer to the shore to try and get more shelter

After a few hours things calmed down and by dawn the storm had broken. We rested in Tropea and waited out the last of the big southerly weather.

The last leg of our journey always feels the best, soon we would be home in Corfu.

The final part of the trip saw us through the straights with the backdrop of snow covered Mount Etna puffing away in the distance.

While most of the Med has little to no tide, the narrow straights can cause very strong tidal flow, with spring rates being up to 5 knots in either direction.

We calculated our arrival time and had a gentle 3 knots of flow behind us.

Dodging ferries and shipping we skirted the whirlpools to finally enter the Ionian Sea.

We were then blessed by 24 hours of flat seas and a fabulous sunset, finally arriving "home" to Gouvia Marina on Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> February, tired but in high spirits due to the "job well done".

MISSION: QUALIFY AS RYA DAY SKIPPERS

With over 7 years of flotilla lead crew experience between them, ex-Hosties
Jen, Ellen and Bex decided it was about time they got Day
Skipper qualified!

We got underway with our online theory course, this was the bit that was least familiar to all of us.

The online course involves plotting positions, planning passages and using tide timetables.

We all managed to pass this bit, then it was just the practical course to worry about!

#### **ARRIVING IN GOUVIA**

On 6th October we boarded a plane from Gatwick bound for Corfu.

On arrival in Gouvia Marina we were shown to our home for the week, the Dufour 36 Knight Odyssey.

We were delighted to discover that Pete (or Uncle Pete to some) would be the lucky one guiding us through our course.

Having spent plenty of time on board yachts there wasn't too much to go through with regards to housekeeping.

The first job on the list was to provision the yacht for the first day or so out on the water.

As Hosties, this is second nature to us and we made sure that we would be well fed whilst on board! A well fed crew is a happy crew...

After making beds and a bit of unpacking, we spent the rest of the afternoon relaxing in the sunshine and enjoying a few liquid refreshments.

It was then time for an early night before the learning commenced the following morning.

#### **DAY 1 - SAILING TO SAYAIDHA**

We were up and with a cup of tea in hand ready for our first day! Pete went through several safety elements including the location of the life jackets and the fire extinguishers.

We talked through the importance of knowing the location of all the sea-cocks and how to prepare the yacht for a day on the water.

This was a great refresher for us all and we managed to ask plenty of questions...which, according to Pete, were not silly questions!

Each day Pete would designate a skipper for the day and a navigator, today it was Ellen's turn to take charge on the passage to Sayaidha and Jen's job to get us there!

We motored out of Gouvia and before too long Pete had us doing doughnuts in the bay! There was a point to this exercise and this soon became apparent. We played around with the prop wash and the prop walk and learnt how we could use these to our advantage when manoeuvring.

We had a spot of lunch and then raised the sails before heading in the general direction of Sayaidha.

The wind was not playing ball so after a while we popped the motor on and powered on.

Those that have visited
Sayaidha before will know how
daunting the entrance to the
harbour can look at first sight.
It is incredibly narrow and does
not look like a yacht should fit
through it!

Ellen took the helm and expertly got us into the harbour and parked us up stern-to. First day done! We set course for Vido Island, north of Corfu Town. Here we anchored, had some lunch and enjoyed our first swim.

We then tried our hand at sailing off anchor, this was a new skill for all of us and we think we did pretty well!

The afternoon was spent tacking and gybing in the bay before heading into Corfu Yacht Club.

In the evening we spruced ourselves up and set off in search of some sustenance in historic Corfu Old Town.

#### DAY 3 - 30 MILES TO LAKKA

Today we had a navigational challenge on our hands.
We needed to use clearing bearings in order to get around the Lefkimmi Point (a sand bar on the south east of Corfu) often know as the Venus Fly Trap of the Ionian.



#### **DAY 2 - ON TO CORFU TOWN**

Today it was Ellen's turn to navigate and Bex's turn to take charge. Passage plans were drawn up and we were off!

Before setting sail for Corfu Pete got all three of us to travel in and out of the narrow harbour entrance and also turn the yacht within the harbour itself.

This was to get to grips with manoeuvring in tight spaces. He assured us that he would definitely not let us crash into anything! Thanks Pete... We managed to arrive in Lakka in one piece and avoided the sand bar! Once Jen had safely moored us up stern-to, we enjoyed a celebratory beer.

#### **DAY 4 - THE NIGHT SAIL AWAITS**

We left Lakka in glorious sunshine and made the most of the wind. Some cloud started forming over Paxos island so we decided to sail to Mongonissi for lunch.

Whilst anchored Pete talked us through basic engine checks and maintenance.



We then waited until the sun was just setting and headed out into the night! Part of the Day Skipper course is to sail at night and to consider all the things that come with this.

We spent time navigating using the lighthouse outside Gaios and making sure we steered well clear of the reef! After a few hours we made our way into the south entrance at Gaios and moored up.

#### **DAY 5 - OVER TO THE MAINLAND**

The sea was flat calm and there was very little wind to be found! We decided to motor over towards the mainland in the hope that the wind might increase in the afternoon.

Outside Sivota Mourtos we spent some time sailing up to a buoy in preparation for our Man Overboard drill. This involves depowering the mainsail in order to allow one of the crew to pick up the buoy.

#### DAY 6 - HOMEWARD BOUND

The next morning we ran through side-to mooring. Unfortunately this involved disturbing some of the local fishermen!

We managed one last lunch stop and a swim before tying up in the marina.

On return to the marina we were informed by Pete that we had all managed to pass the RYA Day Skipper course! G&T's all round!









#### EARLY SUMMER FLOTILLA OFFERINGS

A couple of extended sailing escapes for April...

This year we have a few special flotillas sailing at the end of April. These include two "extended flotillas".

Our first Faraway Islands flotilla of the summer will now begin on Friday 24th April (as opposed Faraway Islands is to the 26th), giving you two extra days of sailing - 16 days for of year, but there is the same price as a two week holiday.

The reason for this is that our Sunday flights out to Greece on the 26th are almost full, so it makes sense for one or two flotillas to go out a couple of days earlier!

Enjoy three weekends on a two week holiday or two weekends on a one weeker - can't be bad in terms of time off work!

The one week holiday will follow the route of our Corfu Sheltered Waters flotilla and will be doing 9 days for the price of 7! Two days sailing for nothing.

The Ionian Islands can be a joy at this time of year.

We are usually the first flotilla sailing company up and running, so we often have the harbours and bays to ourselves!

THE NEW HARBOUR AT ERICOUSA

Sailing up to the a treat at any time something particularly special about the lack of other watercraft around!

The water isn't quite up to summer temperature yet but some hardy souls can be seen taking refreshing dips.

The new harbour at Ericousa makes this island a great stop for our flotillas. There is now more than enough space for everyone to moor on the quay. You also have the option to free swing in the bay. This is a very special experience.

All three of the Faraway Islands (Ericousa, Othoni and Mathraki) are blessed with crystal clear emerald waters.

Both of these flotillas are likely to visit the north most coastal villages of Corfu, St. Stephanos and Kassiopi.

They have long been popular stops for the flotillas. The joys of visiting these old favourite spots remains undimmed!

The channel between Corfu and the mainland often offers some of the best sailing in the area, it is a good spot for some tacking practice!

You could sail for 16 days from just £555 per person (including flights). These "extended flotillas" are only available at the beginning of the summer.

There are many jobs to be ticked off before the boats are launched. Flotilla lead crews work with the shorebased team to get their fleets ready.

Here are just a few jobs that are on the Skippers' checklist:

- Splice warp to anchor chains and attach anchors
- Check the steering systems and put on the steering wheels
- Check cutlass bearings
- Check and maintain the skin fittings and seals of seacocks
- Check deck fittings
- Prepare each boat for antifouling

- Attach propellers/rudders
- Polish hulls
- Maintain teak decks
- Replace stickers

Our Engineers don't have an easy task during build-up. Not only do they team up with their Skippers and spread the load, they have a huge responsibility themselves before the big launch day.

Here's an idea of what they need to sort before lift in day:

- Plumbing for heads (toilets)
- Run all the engines
- Test all the electrics
- Check the seacocks and make sure they're SHUT!
- · Check the drive train (gearbox, shaft, propeller and bearings)

Any hiccups are resolved quickly. The odd beer fine is handed out so the crews can pay for their mistakes and to make sure they're not repeated!

One of the bigger jobs we took on over the winter was updating the last five of our Beneteau 311's. They were our only remaining tiller steer yachts - they now have shiny new

We also changed them from slab reef sails to in-mast furling, to finally standardise our entire fleet on furling sail systems.

Once the on-land work has been done, the yachts are all lifted back into the water. The running rigging and sails are put back on the boats.

Then the "Hosties" arrive to get the interiors sparkling clean. They fit the cushions back on, load the all-important inventory, and do all the final touches.

All this work takes place between February and the end of April. The crews work to a fairly tight schedule, but somehow they manage to pull it off every year!

#### RECYCLING GREEK STYLE....

We know that the Greek Islands are not renowned for their recycling facilities (this is improving year on year).

It actually wasn't until Western tourism arrived on the Greek Islands that waste management became something the locals needed to think about more.

The Greek way of life was always very much reuse, reuse, reuse and this can still be seen in many of the small villages we visit.

However, we have spotted some ingenious and creative means of reusing modern used items that would ordinarily have ended up in the bin!

Heidi spotted these whilst on her travels in Lefkas. Engineer Vicki recycled fenders at our Sivota store and used them as plant pots which we think is a pretty creative way to recycle.





#### AITO PROJECT PROTECT

n 2019 we decided to join AITO's Project Protect programme, an initiative for travel companies to become more sustainable and eco-friendly.

Each company devises a pledge that summarises their commitment to sustainability, how they wish to improve their own efforts and what results they hope to see.

In Greece we are aware of the plastic pollution caused by the purchasing of multiple plastic bottles of water by our staff members and clients.



We have teamed up with Water-to-Go, a company that produces filtered water bottles which remove 99.9% of bacteria making the tap water safe and pleasant to drink.

We calculated that an average flotilla sailor goes through around 3 large plastic bottles of water a day, which costs roughly €10 a week.

In addition to this project, we have started to work on lots of other things we can do to reduce our impact on the environment, both in Greece and our London office.

We're trying to find compostable/degradable single-use items like our punch party cups and bin bags – things we get through a lot of.

In an ideal world we'd switch to electric engines and install solar panels in an instant! But things like that take time and a lot of money, so for now we are starting small.

With your help we can only improve and we'll continue to work hard to protect the beautiful Greek Islands we love to sail around!

#### Stokey Woodall Talks at Southampton Boat Show

Stokey explains how common sense is vital in ocean navigation. Things like finding your way in fog and out in the landless ocean.

Stokey has crossed the Atlantic many times and is an old fashioned navigator.

Very handy when the modern electrics fail!

It was a great reminder that the practical side of navigation is equally as important as the electronic side (which has made us lazy)! Satellites can be switched off!



#### Kostas from Steni Vala on Alonissos is recognised by the Greek Academy


In 2018 our good friend in Steni Vala, Kostas Mavrikis wrote an amazing book.




Plenty of our flotilla sailors and lead crews took part. It is always a great way to wave goodbye to the summer season!



You may see some photographs from the Sailing Holidays History Book appearing here and there, as we are very much part of the last 40 or 50 years of sailing the Med.


It goes all the way back to the Pharaohs of Egypt and their luxurious vessels.

#### NIDRI - LOCAL WOODEN BOAT BUILD

As we drive backwards and forwards from Nidri to Sivota Bay on Lefkas Island, we notice all sorts of things going on.

In this day and age, of almost everything being fibreglass, we were amazed to see the frames of an enormous local caique being erected in a boatyard beside the road.

Slowly but surely and using many traditional tools and methods she began to take shape.



It felt like we were witnessing history before our very eyes. Suddenly she was planked and before we knew it launched into Vliho bay.

Not so many years ago, she would have been used for fishing as a "mother boat" for half a dozen smaller caiques which spent the nights fishing for calamari.

However, tourism has changed all that and she will spend her life entertaining lucky tourists as they cruise around the islands.

There are not many traditional fishing families left around the lonian Islands and we savour our friends in the village of Petriti who battle on with traditional fishing methods.





#### YANNIS, THE FERRYMAN FROM PARGA, TAKES A YEAR OFF


For the first time in 44 years

#### THE OLD GIRL IS STILL GOING...THE HISTORY OF POCKET ROCKET

In the late 70's, six UFO 27 hulls were purchased by Tom Keen on the advice of his son Thomas. Only a couple were ever completed properly and used as lead boats in the 1980s.

They were eventually abandoned in a boatyard but Barrie couldn't resist getting his old lead boat back in the late 90s as a project for taking part in the Ionian regattas in September and October. She then remained very much part of the Sailing Holidays history.

Pocket Rocket was largely rebuilt inside and was fitted with a spare Jaguar mast and a couple of larger sails.

Sailing Holidays now had its own budget regatta yacht in order to compete with the ever growing number of local boats appearing on the scene.

Over the years she has taken first place twice at both of the lonian regattas.

She is a 'light airs' yacht, so in windy years, she tends to finish down the field.

However, she was a distraction from the mainstream yachts and of course an extra cost.

We decided to donate her to the NAOK Yacht Club in Corfu for the teenagers of the island to experience sailing in their own local waters. Many people around the islands assumed that people who went sailing were rich, but in fact the opposite is largely true, as yachts cost so much to keep!

We watched the children's "Oppi" (Optimist) fleet go from half a dozen to over 30 yachts now, so the future looks bright.

Now the youngsters have a stepping stone into larger yachts and by all accounts they are doing well in club events.

The young people are also learning about keeping a boat "ship shape" so she is well maintained and regularly raced.




#### GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS


Thank you for another outstanding two week flotilla holiday!

#### January 12th

The two crews arrived on Tenerife and we were greeted by Will, Pete and Charlie.

Our yachts Tinto and Camino, both Dufour 412s, were ready for us to board.

The first evening was low key, a group meal was in order at a local restaurant.

We left the marina on a bright morning with a moderate wind blowing at force 4-5.

# January 13<sup>th</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup> - Distance: 140NM

Instructors Will and Pete had prepared our first passage plan and we set a course for the island of El Hierro.

We each practiced man overboard under motor and sail, crash tacking and gybing.

A fender and a length of warp made a makeshift man overboard who became affectionately known as 'Bob'. With the crews working in pairs for night watches, it was generally three hours on and six hours off.

In order to practice entering a marina at night we planned to arrive at Puerto de la Estaca, enter the marina, turn around and then head for La Palma.

We had some challenging and exhilarating sailing with winds up to force 7, gusting 8. Despite being heavily reefed we reached a speed of 10.6 knots.

The crews had an enjoyable meal at a restaurant fronting onto a black sand beach.



# January 15<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> - Distance: 63NM

We departed Marina Tazacorte and sailed around the north of La Palma beating into a force 6.

# January 16<sup>th</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup> - Distance: 222NM

Our sail to Lanzarote was to be our longest passage which would take us over 37 hours.

Will threw in an impromptu man overboard at one point to test out our skipper Pete and his crew, so Bob was called into action once again!

We spent the day and the following night at Marina Rubicon for some well-earned R&R, a few beers and a pleasant group meal.

January 19<sup>th</sup> - Distance: 46NM
With the wind on our nose at force 3-4, we tacked up the east coast of Lanzarote for what by now seemed like a short hop of 46NM to Marina Lanzarote.



#### January 20<sup>th</sup> - Distance: 38NM

We left Marina Lanzarote and once again beat up the east coast. The scenery as we sailed through the Estrecho del Rio, the channel between Lanzarote and Isla Graciosa, was stunning.

That evening Camino spent the night in the marina at Caleta del Sebo. Tinto's crew opted to free swing at Playa Francesa about 2NM further on.

The crew took turns on anchor watch during the night. I spent a peaceful hour reading in the cockpit waiting for the blood moon to appear.

January 21<sup>st</sup> - Distance: 122NM Both yachts set a course of 240°M heading for Gran Canaria and the marina at Puerto de Las Palmas.

The wind blew force 2-4 and behind us all the way, we surfed to Gran Canaria on big rollers.

As we approached Las Palmas we were hailed on the VHF by a solo rower who was attempting to cross the Atlantic.

He had diverted to Gran
Canaria due to illness and
problems with his navigation
systems. He was concerned
that we were a large tanker as
he was not able to identify us
on his AIS system. We allayed his
fears and the crews eventually
met up with him later that day.

#### January 22<sup>nd</sup>

After a 30 minute stroll turned into a one hour hike we had some delicious tapas and the odd cold beer.

January 23<sup>rd</sup> - Distance: 103NM We headed north to round the top of Gran Canaria bound for La Gomera.

For the first time we really felt the effects of the wind acceleration zones between Tenerife and Gran Canaria. We also had to be aware of our position in relation to the Traffic Separation Scheme that runs between the islands.

As we passed Tenerife, the wind died on us for the first time on our trip and so we motorsailed the last few miles until we arrived at Marina La Gomera at San Sebastián.

#### January 24th

On our final rest day the crews each did their own thing. Tinto's mob took a taxi trip to sample the tapas and beer at Mirador de Abrante. Camino's crew explored San Sebastián with the more energetic walking up the hill that overlooked the town.

#### January 25<sup>th</sup> - Distance: 32NM

The wind once again deserted us for our last short passage back to Las Galletas. We motored to Tenerife and whale watched along the way.



The crews celebrated the end of the trip in their own ways, Camino cracked open the champagne and Tinto the cans of lager. We emptied the fridge for our last meal on board which was a melange of culinary delights.

#### Living on board...

For seven relative strangers to be thrown together aboard a 41ft yacht, albeit with a shared love of the sea and sailing, could have been a recipe for, if not disaster then potential niggles. Having shared meals and stories with both crews and Will and Pete it is evident that both crews gelled as teams and although dealing with things in different ways just got on with it and thoroughly embraced and enjoyed the experience.



Cooking on board could be challenging particularly in a rolling sea but we all took turns and ate really well, a meal tastes great after a days' sailing. Some crew members were more adventurous, Bill decided to serve up a roast dinner!

Will and Pete are extremely professional and good at what they do. The success of the trip was due in no small part to how they led us, imparted their knowledge, fashioned us into teams and above all had our safety as their paramount concern.



#### FINLAY FROM OUR OFFICE ESCAPES TO SUNNY TURKEY!

aving left the UK on a rainy summer day, we received a warm welcome as we landed in Turkey! Our home for the week was a Sun Odyssey 410 with all the bells and whistles you could ask for. The next morning, following a thorough briefing and a substantial supply shop, we were ready to get going!

#### DAY 1: MARMARIS TO ÇIFTLIK BAY

We set off with the sun blazing and not a cloud in sight. A casual 2 hour motor down the coast took us to our first anchorage of the week, Çiftlik Bay.

Anchor dug in, it was time for dinner. With a choice of 3 restaurants, we eventually decided on Azmak where we dined on fresh dorado and quenched our thirst with the local brew, Efes.

# DAY 2: ÇIFTLIK BAY TO BOZUKKALE

Our first full day was all about re-familiarising ourselves with boat life as we headed down the coast in search of bays.

The prevailing North Westerly created a great opportunity to go through the motions as we beat into the wind for the better part of the morning.

Our bay stop for lunch was called Serçe Limanı.



Once longlined, we were able to admire this beautiful inlet which cuts back into the land and boasts some of the clearest water I have ever seen.

A quick hop over to Bozukkale was next. The remains of an ancient fortress lines the hillside as you make your approach, which we later discovered made for a cracking viewpoint.

We dropped our anchor before taking a few lines ashore with the help of some enterprising restaurateurs.

# DAY 3: BOZUKKALE TO BOZBURUN

An early start and an important day ahead as we set sail for Bozburun. Having not seen a town since Marmaris the crew were keen to set foot on land.

More pressing was our need to restock the boat with food (and maybe some beer).

A quick lunch on the go before a couple of cooling swims and it was time to make port.

An excellent dinner quayside followed by some refreshments at Osman's restaurant was more than enough before lights out. The town had been a much needed and enjoyable stop, but we couldn't wait to get back into bays.

#### DAY 4: BOZBURUN TO DIRSEK BÜKÜ

A lazy start to the day with breakfast ashore and a supplies shop, finally saw us leaving harbour at midday.

Once out in the open, we were spurred on by a strong breeze to put the sails up. With not far to travel today, it was lovely to be sailing.

This evenings stop was one we had been looking forward to, a stunning bay called Dirsek Bükü.

Not only did this represent our furthest reach from Marmaris, it had also been praised by the base team as one of Turkey's best bays.

Without a doubt, they were not lying! With gin-clear water and shelter from most angles, it definitely lived up to expectations. A small restaurant ashore provided us with some much needed sustenance (and local olive oil).

#### DAY 5: DIRSEK BÜKÜ TO KUMLUBÜK

Our earliest start of the week promised our best and longest day of sailing yet, an uninterrupted 5 hour leg back in the direction of Marmaris.

With a strong North Westerly blowing we flew down the coast topping 10 knots and leaving several other yachts in our wake. At this point in the week, everyone knew their roles on the yacht and we were starting to function like a well-oiled machine.

Driven by the thought of our week coming to an end, the crew were keen to gorge themselves on as much food, drink and sun as possible.

With the chain up, we motored for another hour before reaching Kumlubük.

This is a huge moon shaped bay with several restaurants scattered along the shore.

Another delicious cockpit dinner capped off what had been yet another seamless day on the boat.

#### DAY 6: KUMLUBÜK TO MARMARIS

Compelled by the knowledge this was to be our last day aboard, making the most of our time left was a must.

In order to stay ahead of the other charters returning to base, our first play of the day was to refuel our tanks back at the marina.

Tank full, we found a little bay 30 minutes from the marina where we spent our final hours reflecting on the week we'd had.

Nestled in between two fishing boats and with a warm sun beating down, we all agreed it is easy to see why Turkey has long been one of the greatest sailing destinations in the Mediterranean.

We will definitely return here and I highly recommend this sailing area to anyone who has a mind for a Turkish holiday.

#### LIZ POTTER CRUISES THE DALMATIAN ISLANDS FOR A WEEK

This is the story of the Croatian travels of Liz and Andrew Potter, from West Kirby Sailing Club on the Wirral, who put aside their four racing dinghies for a week in favour of an alternative salty adventure in a 38ft yacht.

#### **ARRIVAL IN SPLIT**

We arrived at Kastela marina at around 10pm, we had been given the pontoon number where Minnie, our Hanse 385, was berthed.

#### **DAY ONE - BRAC ISLAND**

After a familiarisation of the boat by the charter company we left the marina in light winds.

Arriving at the port of Milna on Brac island by early evening, where we chose to anchor on the far side of the harbour.

Next came the drama of getting the tender off the deck. The little rubber boat was very small.

This was not going to stop us from getting a meal and a beer!

In our haste to get ashore, we had failed to put on the yacht's masthead lights. Fuelled on beer and slight apprehension, we crossed the dark waterway towards our unlit vessel, with our way lit by the phosphorescence of thousands of microscopic plankton under a blanket of stars.

#### **DAY TWO - VIS ISLAND**

After a leisurely breakfast in the warm sunshine on deck, we made a late start. A little wind put us close-hauled to Vis, which became our destination.

We approached the far side of the island and decided to stop over in the port of Komiza, which was the closest point to the small Island of Bisevo; location of the blue cave.

Once inside the harbour, we were met by a RIB, who directed us to the buoyed area, to pick up a mooring.

We had a delightful meal in a small restaurant off a shady backstreet in town.

We feasted on a Dalmation dish of beef and gnocci in a rich aromatic sauce, accompanied by local island wine.

#### **DAY THREE - BISEVO ISLAND**

By 8am, there was already a line of boats heading for Bisevo. We joined the exodus.

Access to the cave was only possible with a guided tour launch, which passed by the moorings, where many yacht crews awaited a turn.

We were lucky to pick up a mooring just as one yacht was leaving and were collected.

The blue cave was in the next bay and was but a tiny gap at the bottom of the cliff face. We all had to duck and the dark stone corridor swallowed us.

After a short echoing passage, where the boatman turned off his engine, the boat emerged into a bolt of the brightest blue, as the sun lit the water from the cave's underwater entrance.

Back on our boat, we returned to Komiza for some supplies, before setting off in a direction dictated by the current wind, the forecast and a few whims.

We ended up heading for the main town port of Vis. We picked up a mooring on the quieter side of Vis harbour, called Kut, and enjoyed the end of day sunshine. The weather looked set to change, forecasts showed wind and thunderstorms for the next day.

#### **DAY FOUR - SOLTA ISLAND**

A quick on-deck inspection at 06:00 showed that some strong gusts were blowing across our sheltered bay.

I reacted in a very British way and put on the kettle and make a very large cup of tea.

In the end we slipped the mooring at 07:30, put up the sails and headed out of our cove.

By 10:30 we were at the coast of the Island of Solta, looking for the lee of the island to anchor and have some breakfast.

Before arriving at the port in Maslinica, we stumbled across a lengthy inlet called Sesula. We decided to pick up a mooring due to the stormy weather.

As it turned out, this was an excellent decision, as the mooring was owned by the little bistro ashore and the overnight stay was free for customers.



Owner Sasha came to fetch us in his small boat, so we avoided the tiresome paddling experience. We had a very pleasant lunch at the bistro and took a walk over the hill to examine Maslinica marina.

Sasha came back to collect us for dinner. During the meal, the sky started to flash with distant lightning as the storm rolled in over the hills. After a while, deluges of water were pouring down outside and thunder rumbled overhead. We made a dash for the boat once the rain had eased.

#### **DAY FIVE - ROGOZNICA**

The skies were dark grey and there appeared to be some wind out of the harbour. Soon after leaving harbour the wind started to increase, so, at 18 knots of wind, we made a decision to reef early.

Almost as soon as the reef was in, the wind gusted 25 knots. The radio piped up on channel 16 in Croatian, which was later repeated in English for the sole mad English people still out on the water "Gale warning, gale warning, gale warning, gale warning, gale warning, as we were mid passage to our bolt hole of Rogoznica on the mainland.

Ahead was looking dark and menacing, but with the wind astern and the dark and menacing skies behind us looking some way off, we pressed on.

It was with relief that we finally dropped sails to head into Marina Frapa, cold and wet.

#### **DAY SIX - KASTELA**

It was sails up and away for a long challenging sail to return to the starting point.

The wind shifted during the morning, so we chose to sail inside the mass of small islands, rather than around.

We finally turned into Split bay for the last 6 miles in 15 knots of wind on the nose. A glorious last beat to end a wonderful week of adventures.
