BRITISH PASSPORT HOLDERS, DON'T FORGET:

Due to Brexit, travel to Europe has become more complicated:


Your passport is now only valid for 5 or 10 years from the DATE OF ISSUE (check your Date of Issue) and must be less than 5 or 10 years old on the day you enter Europe. Don't forget children's passports are only valid for 5 years.

It must also be valid for at least 3 months from the date of your return.

Winter is a good time to check and, if necessary, renew your passport.

You can check the most up-to-date passport detail requirements on the government website.

ACE OF BLADES

Kit Windsor, flotilla skipper from 2016 - is about to row the Atlantic with 3 other women on a Rannoch R45 ocean rowing boat called "SS1". In December 2023 they will be rowing 3,000 miles across the Atlantic with three other women, as part of the World's Toughest Row – The Atlantic Challenge.

They will depart from La Gomera in the Canary Islands and head to English Harbour in Antigua, hoping to arrive in less than 40 days. The four of them are undertaking this challenge in aid of three charities: **Macmillan Cancer**, the Outward Bound Trust and Prostate Cymru.

Heading out into the vast Atlantic Ocean in an 8 metre by 2 metre boat, rowing two hours on and two hours off throughout the duration of the crossing, is not something most people would be keen to take on.

"I am so excited to be involved in Ace of Blades and to be taking part in the Atlantic Challenge. It's been on my bucket list for years and I remember having a conversation with my dad and saying "I'm going to do it". His response was, "Maybe when you're 30!" – well, here I am!

I've always been pretty adventurous but this challenge will take the biscuit. I feel like my family have sometimes questioned where I came from! After university, I bobbed around the Ionian Sea for a couple of years working as a skipper, which was incredible and fuelled my need to be surrounded by water."

Heather first came on a flotilla sailing holiday with her parents and grandparents in 2005.

Sailing is in Heather Thomas' blood, coming from a long line of mariners. Growing up in Otley, West Yorkshire, the sea was not close by, so Heather began her journey dinghy sailing at the local lake, Otley Sailing Club, encouraged by her father.

The Andrew Simpson Sailing Foundation gave Heather her first taste of ocean sailing, with a bursary to compete in the Pacific Leg of the 2015/16 Clipper Round the World Race.

Maiden has been a big inspiration to Heather throughout her sailing career, so to sail on her is a dream come true. Whilst on the Maiden programme she gained her RYA Yachtmaster Offshore (commercially endorsed).

She loves inspiring young girls to dream big, a value that was instilled in her by her parents, who continue to be her biggest supporters.



"I'm pretty tired, I'm not going to lie. The last 24 hours have been pretty tricky navigation-wise so I've been up for the last 24 hours as there was so much going on. To be honest the Southern Ocean was a bit tame.

A lot of the girls were a bit disappointed about how tame it was. So hopefully we can give them a bit more next time.

The Tasman Sea was the roughest part. But I'm very happy to be here. New Zealand feels like home to me."

Barrie returns to Kassiopi after only sporadic visits in the last forty years or so!

It really is a small world sometimes. I was standing in Athens airport a few years ago and had a tap on my shoulder from a tall young Greek chap. He said "Hello Barrie, I haven't seen you for years!" I was mystified until he proclaimed "It's me, Costa from Kassiopi – we used to dance together!"

The penny dropped – the Costa I knew was a child of about four foot tall and now he was six foot six! In the very early days of flotillas, and even before asphalt roads, after the meal and lots of lubricant, the entertainment was always Greek dancing, long into the night. Entire local families would join in.

We also came to know Philipos who ran a cocktail bar and now runs hire boats, Angelos whose Dad had the Supermarket, and Vassilis who ran a small bar and taverna on the waterfront.

When we turned up with a flotilla at the end of October, it felt like we had never been away, although the road was now asphalted! Not any wider however!

Vassilis' daughter had spent time in Athens training to be a Chef. She has created a fabulous restaurant, overlooking the waterfront. It was great to see Vassillis and they put on a fantastic evening for us. This was an 'October half term flotilla' so there were 22 young children between the ages of 1 and 12. Hostess Emily had them doing all sorts of games and the evening never had a dull moment. Vassillis and I sat and observed from the 'old fellas corner'!

I had some great memories from Kassiopi and this was no less of a memory. In the morning, we awoke to the local brass band and a couple of hundred young locals parading in memory of "Ochi Day" during the Second World War, when Greece said "no, you can't come in" to Benito Mussolini. The result was the loss of 25% of the Greek population, so it is a date not to be forgotten.

It was another beautiful October day so we squeezed in a final swim in an idyllic bay before sailing back to Gouvia marina, having reminded ourselves of what wonderful experiences all the flotillas are, no matter how old (or young) you might be!

Central Otago, New Zealand


In February, it is midsummer in New Zealand, and that is when our daughter Amy decided to marry her partner, Scott, near Wanaka in the high country of the South Island.


Many of our regular flotilla sailing gang will have met Amy out on the water over the decades and I'm sure will wish her well.






Ellen's Recommended Greek books - part 2!

MYTHOS - STEPHEN FRY

'Mythos' is the first book in
Fry's trilogy and starts with
Chaos, from which the universe
and everything in it is borne,
according to Greek mythology.
It's the perfect introduction
to some of the most popular
myths, and I couldn't help
but hear Stephen's inimitable
voice in my head as I read it.
Each 'character' has their own

chapter and Fry briefly, but expertly, tells their story. Did you know that the word 'echo' comes from the myth of Echo the nymph, who is punished by Hera for gossiping – her punishment is that she can no longer speak, except to repeat the very last thing said to her, hence our use of the word today. Fascinating stuff!





HEROES - STEPHEN FRY

The second volume in the Trilogy, 'Heroes' focusses on the trials and tribulations of the most popular mortal heroes of Greek myth. We learn about the adventures of Heracles, Theseus and Jason, and the tragic

stories of Oedipus and Orpheus (and Eurydice!). Similarly to 'Mythos', each character has their own chapter and as it's written with Fry's unmistakable humour and charm, it's an unputdownable read.

ANTIGONE RISING - HELEN MORALES

This is one of my favourites so far. Rather than a simple retelling of myths or re-positioning of protagonists within them, this book discusses the power of the myths themselves and how they have shaped the way we live our lives today. Morales talks about how ancient myths have often been 'misread' in a way that resists progressive agendas, and it sheds light on

how deep-rooted cultural and societal norms were borne from these myths. It's hard to change perceptions when they have been ingrained in us since time began! But there is hope yet. This was a real eye-opener and I would recommend highly to anyone ready to cast a critical eye on some of the backward ways of the world these days...
