THE GOINGS ON OF THE SUMMER

very year here at Sailing Holidays we wait with bated breath for the "big event of the summer".

The thing that is going to challenge us, to throw us off our course and to make us think "jeez it can't get much worse than this".

In the past 10 years alone we have had a volcanic eruption, two major airline collapses, a Greek financial crisis and two Medicanes.

However, if you had told us, back in January, we would be looking at a delayed start to our summer - we wouldn't have believed you.

Our team are always ready to spring into action and we pride ourselves in getting people out on the water no matter what.

Not to sound too dramatic but...we continue to try to overcome all the obstacles we come across.

This year was a little different...

Back in March our shorebased team were gearing up to get our season underway.

The engineers and skippers had arrived in Greece and work in the yard was going well. Whisperings of Coronavirus had begun but, like many others, we retained a positive outlook.

LOCKDOWN BEGINS!

In mid-March lockdown measures for the UK, Greece and the rest of the world were announced. This led to our London office having to adapt to remote working and our team in Greece having to down tools.

Our lead crews (much to their disappointment) were flown home on one of the last flights to leave Corfu. Many were keen to stay, believing that it would only be a few weeks, maybe a month at the most, before they would be able to get back to their summer on the water.

Even at this point (perhaps naively) we thought we may be able to get the boats in the water by the beginning of May.

We started sending a weekly update email to all those due to sail with us.

We gather this became a welcome Friday afternoon distraction for many of you.

As the weeks went on, it became clear that our early summer sailing was going to have to be put on hold.

This is when we began the mammoth task of calling all our sailors. We started with our late April and early May departures.

SUMMER COMES TO A HALT

The response from you all was amazing. Speaking to everyone was a bit of a treat and a welcome distraction from being stuck at home.

Most people had expected the outcome of the call and were understandably disappointed they would not be setting sail.

However, the support was overwhelming and the number of bookings that were deferred to 2021 showed us what a determined group you are.

We understand some people were not able to commit to a holiday in 2021 but, all the same, the kind words and sentiments were still echoed.

Lockdown continued, and the only thing we could actually rely on was that we would be standing on our doorsteps on a Thursday evening clapping like mad things.

As the weeks drew on, it seemed the likelihood of any of us seeing the sun this side of Christmas was slim.

SAY HELLO TO SUMMER

Then, at the beginning of July we got the news we had been waiting for. Travel corridors would be opening, meaning the summer was back on.

As you can probably imagine, our team in Greece were raring to go and began work getting 50 of our yachts ready for action.

Feeling a little trepidation, we began contacting people informing them their holiday was going to be happening.

We were a bit worried the appetite for foreign travel would not be there and our work on the boats would be for nothing.

However, it seemed you were keener than ever for a spot of sun, sea and sailing.

We managed to sail from 19th July right through to the end of October and every yacht was booked.

KEEPING YOU SAFE

Our team in Greece had a little more on their plates this summer with COVID regulations (understandably) being quite strict.

Inventory including cups, mugs, plates and crockery was removed from the yachts after each flotilla and replaced.

All staff who prepared your linen packs wore masks and gloves throughout. The linen was then placed in plastic bags to ensure no contamination.

On turnaround days, our cleaners scrubbed the yachts from top to bottom. Once all work on board was complete the boats were left to air for a minimum of 3 hours.

We wanted to ensure we did everything we possibly could to make sure our sailors, our lead crews and our shorebased team felt safe.

The only difference this year was the requirement for DIY daily temperature and blood oxygen level checks on each boat. These were recorded on a sheet and available should the Port Police request them.



HAPPY SAILORS

From your reviews, emails, letters and social media posts it seems all those who sailed with us this year had a fantastic time.

If anything, the joy of our holidays was only heightened by the fact we had all been cooped up for so long.

We have included some of your comments later on. Our team enjoy reading them and it goes to prove that all the hard work was really worth it.

A new phenomenon we have come across is one we are aoing to name "the ones who can't get enough".

On several occasions this year we have had some very last minute cancellations due to one reason or another.

The people who snapped these up were more often than not those who were already out sailing with us.

We are not going to blame the one or two sundowners that may or may not have been consumed. We are going to blame the undoubted "get away from it all feeling" Greece has had this year.

The islands we visit on our holidays are special for many reasons but this year it was more apparent than ever.

With most other companies abandoning their summer programme completely, we found we had many of the towns, harbours and coastal villages to ourselves.

Not only did this give us flashbacks to the 70's, but it also helped with the relaxing and the unwinding that was more than needed.

Once you stepped off the plane in Greece, you couldn't help but allow the relaxed atmosphere to take over. The islands remained almost untouched by COVID-19.

The local people were very conscientious but, with outdoor dining being the norm, the only time you were reminded of the virus was when entering shops.

We have rambled on enough, so please enjoy this look back on 2020.

Our team in Greece managed to get the Ionian flotillas running and the atmosphere was very special.

The travel awards were all online this year so thanks to everyone who voted for us. The BTA's are very special within travel and tourism and the results are decided solely by you....our flotilla sailors.

SAILING HOLIDAYS:

The start of so many life adventures...

People often believe the ability to sail the emerald waters of the Greek islands in the comfort of their own yacht is well out of reach! It all started with a Jag...



I have never been the sort of person who enjoys sunbathing or reading a book beside a swimming pool whilst on holiday – a trait that my

wife, Debz, has become used to. I prefer to be indulging in an activity and exploring an area.

So when, in 2014, she asked me where I would like to go on holiday, she was not surprised when I said that I had always fancied a flotilla holiday in Greece. THE FIRST VILLA MEANDROS OLIVE OIL



In January, we flew to Greece
to touch base with our crew,
then we popped down to the
villa for a winter break.
Our friend Dave suggested that

we prune our olive trees and collect the olives.

He knew of an olive pressing operation where it was possible to have the olives converted to oil. We had 2 helpers, one of whom had a chain saw, so suddenly we were olive collectors.

We started on Monday morning and by Wednesday afternoon we had 13 sacks full of olives and were happy to straighten our backs out again!



Chainsaw man Pedro had booked us a slot at the local processing plant, so we loaded up his truck and set off.

We purchased half a dozen shiny new tins (what I knew as 'four gallon tins') from the local mini market on the way and optimism was high.

We duly tipped our olives, one bag at a time, into an outside hopper where a special belt took them past a blower to remove any remaining leaves.



They were then washed a few times before being weighed, rolled and pressed into a pulp. This travelled into another machine and emerged into a stainless tub as perfect looking fairly bright yellow olive oil.

There was a lovely roaring fire going and a really nice atmosphere. They explained that it was traditional to try our oil with a piece of bread dunked into it, so we did just that! It was warm and quite strong in taste.

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At this point, an acidity test is done, which shows the quality of the oil. Ours was 0.6 which apparently means that the oil is extra virgin. The oil was transferred into our tins through what looked like a petrol pump.

Other local people were also there doing their own crops, and we felt like real olive oil virgins with our shiny new tins. All the locals had old plastic containers sometimes with only rags stuffed in the top.

We ended up with 77 litres of olive oil, which was brilliant. We were advised to leave the tops off the tins and cover them with something breathable for a few days after which it would be ready for bottling.

A few dozen bottles were ordered and several days later we began bottling it on the kitchen table.

The idea was to give bottles to anyone we knew, so a label making man in Vliho produced labels for us and bingo, we had our own olive oil.

All the locals had their own oil, so visitors were very happy to have our posh olive oil. There will still be plenty for those who stay at Villa Meandros in 2021.

For those uninitiated, olive oil is not made by crushing the olives with Barrie's big feet – that's grapes.

A fascinating (and tasty) life experience!



IT MIGHT BE TIME TO CHECK YOUR PASSPORT



We thought we ought to mention a bit of craziness in relation to passports. In the UK, if a 5 or 10 year British passport was renewed early, the system simply added on a few months by renewing it for 5 or ten years from the expiry date. Simple you might think?

Nope! Apparently in Europe a passport is only valid from the issue date for the prescribed 5 or 10 years! In addition, passports must be current for at least 6 months after the date of travel. This means that in reality it is a good idea to have at least twelve months validity to cover the six months and also cover any time that sensible and diligent people might have incurred to get their passports renewed nice and early.

The Government website says the following:

"You'll need to have at least 6 months left on an adult or child passport to travel to most countries in Europe (not including Ireland).

If you renewed your current passport before the previous one expired, extra months may have been added to its expiry date. Any extra months on your passport over 10 years will not count towards the 6 months needed."

Your skipper will give you a go whenever it is appropriate and explain all sorts of aspects of sailing generally.

YACHT CHARTER DIVISION MANAGER FIN ENJOYS INDEPENDENT SEPTEMBER BAREBOAT SAILING IN THE IONIAN

aving sailed in the Ionian for many years, returning to this fantastic area is akin to dining out on your favourite dish.

Casting off from Gouvia Marina, I was curious to see how many other yachts we would encounter as we set sail for Paxos. To my delight there were far fewer yachts than expected, both in bays and towns.

LONGOS TO OURSELVES

After a calm 30 mile passage we arrived at Longos, where we found ourselves to be the only vacht in the harbour.

Day two got off to a lazy start and we motored down to Emerald Bay.

What a treat to be here at a time like this, I challenge you to find clearer water! Following a lunch of classic Greek fare, we meandered into Gaios.

THROUGH TO THE SOUTH IONIAN An early start was required as we prepared to take on our biggest day – a 45 mile stretch to Abeliki Bay on the northern side of Meganisi Island.

Once moored in Abeliki bay, we strolled over to Vathi for sundowners and dinner.

After a tasty lunch in a bay on the south eastern side of Meganisi, a strong breeze picked up.

SETTING SAIL FOR KIONI

A fantastic reach saw us topping 9 knots before we eventually tied up in Kioni. An unforgettable day followed by an excellent dinner at the Three Mills - highly recommended.

We set course northbound back to the mainland, where we anchored outside the harbour in a traditional Greek town called Palairos.

Our evening was spent lounging at the yacht club and eating at one of my favourite restaurants, the New Mill Tavern.

Thursday began with another serene and cloudless morning as we plotted a course for Sivota.

Unlike most other places, it was refreshing to see the town in full flow with tavernas along the waterfront as busy as usual with tables just a bit further apart.

We set the sails one last time and made for Ay Euphemia on Kefalonia. One last day of sun, swimming and sailing before returning to the UK.

It goes without saying that you can never tire of the Ionian as a sailing area. Every time you visit you will be guaranteed to find a bay you haven't anchored in before or a taverna you are yet to try.

Kalokeri has long been the flagship yacht of our flotillas. Last year we decided to switch her from full time flotilla service so that she could operate as a skippered charter or an independent sailing option.

She will be based from our pontoon at the Iris Hotel in Nidri, which is an ideal starting point for exploring all the Southern Ionian area has to offer.

Our professional skippers know this sailing area inside out and will be able to show you all the hidden gems. He or she has their own separate cabin at the forward end, so your own privacy, if required, is assured.

Your skipper will be happy to show you the ropes, and get you and your crew as involved as you wish in the practical sailing element of the holiday.

They will also recommend the best village tavernas, bays and inform you about the area generally.

You can choose to invite them to join you for dinner or dine alone (they won't be offended).

The joy of a skippered charter is, even though it is not the cheapest option, the responsibility involved in being in charge of the yacht is taken out of your hands.

You can choose to be as hands on as you wish whilst safe in the knowledge that your skipper will be on hand to make sure everything runs smoothly.

INDEPENDENT SAILING

Many of our flotilla yachts can be booked on an independent sailing basis (including Kalokeri).

The bonus of this is you know that the standard of the yacht is going to be high. Our rigorous maintenance programme ensures your boat is in the best possible condition.

In addition, our shore based team can simply hop in a RIB and be with you in a flash (should you need them).

Those wishing to sail as an independent yacht will be required to hold either an RYA Practical Day Skipper certificate or a valid ICC (International Certificate of Competence) at the least.



LARGER LUXURY YACHTS

Our other one week 50 foot yacht is almost fully booked for the summer. So, if you want a week on Kalokeri, it's the same price as the 50's plus the cost of a skipper if you need one.

Kalokeri is a classic Beneteau 52.3 where en-suite luxury is the prime consideration. The three large cabins are extremely comfortable and there is lots of outdoor space for just relaxing. The "master cabin" is enormous!



As an aside, there are smaller yachts available for independent sailing, so if you fancy one of our flotilla yachts as a bareboat (on the same flight inclusive arrangement as the flotillas) - best to get it booked. This is a popular option for couples.
